Are you the one feeding the cats?

Kern City has received more complaints recently about residents feeding stray cats. Putting food out for the feral cats causes them to increase and they damage neighbors' properties by going through yards and patios and leaving messes and making noise. Some are sick and can infect other cats.

"We know that it's hard not to give food to a cat or other animal like a kit fox that doesn't have a home, but that can weaken the animal's natural ability to find its own food and it can attract other wild animals," said Jolene Simons, president of the KCCA board of directors.

According to the city's CatNip program, feeding stray cats is only kind if they are then trapped and taken to be spayed or neutered. The city's program

requires that the cats then be returned to the neighborhood they came from. While doing that may seem that it doesn't help, spaying and neutering cats keeps them from increasing, and according to the city, those cats will not be as messy or noisy as untreated cats.

"When residents cause cats to be a problem for their neighbors, that becomes a nuisance and that is against our CC&RS," Simons said.

She cited the Declaration of Restrictions, Section H15, which reads: No noxious, offensive or illegal activities shall be conducted within Kern City. Nothing shall be done on or within Kern City that may be or may become an annoyance or nuisance to the residents or Owners, or that in any way

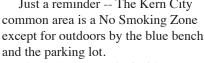
interferes with the quiet enjoyment of residents or Owners.

Simons suggested that if residents are experiencing problems due to a neighbor feeding feral cats, to "please try to talk to them first and help them understand the situation. It is important that we all not only think about how things affect us but how they affect other residents. Being a good neighbor is vital in a community like ours."

Residents whose actions create a nuisance will receive a letter notifying them of the violation, and the penalty process, which can include a hearing and fines after due process, will begin.

Neighborhood Watch

In other reports, a truck was stolen from Demaret Avenue. Also, someone snuck into a garage on River Oaks while the owner left the door open to run inside the house. The thief stole a purse and other items, and tried to steal the vehicle but the key broke off in the lock.

Even though Kern City is safer than a lot of areas of town, it is important to be proactive regarding safety. Do not leave garage doors open! Especially if your keys and purse and other things are in the vehicle. Thieves drive around town looking for "opportunity" thefts, and open garage doors -- even for five or ten minutes -- are opportunities.

Kern City Board Meeting Minutes

D R A F T KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES Jan. 9, 2017, 9:00 a.m.

I. CALL TO ORDER: President Jolene Simons called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other directors present: Bill Allen, Roger Kirby, Steve Parks, Kyle Ray, Tim Smale and Donna Tyner and Manager Jill Foley.

President Simons welcomed attendees, and member Fred Hufnagel led the flag salute.

ANNOUNCEMENT: President Simons said there would be an Executive Board Meeting immediately following the regular board meeting for a hearing regarding a property violation.

- II. MINUTES: Director Tyner. The Jan. 9, 2018 regular board meeting minutes were accepted as presented.
- III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner said that as of Jan. 31, the Operating Account had a balance of \$499,871.99 and the Reserve Account had \$104,100.49. She announced that this month we will transfer \$102,500 from the Operating Account to the Reserve Account per the 2018 budget.
- IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Jill Foley. The deadline for Letters to the Editor and Classified Ads for the Klarion is Feb. 15. We learned of the passing of residents Trudy Douglass, Michael Myers, Doris Parrott, Henry Rivera and Glenn Simpson. We have received 95 percent of the annual assessments, and we will send out pre-lien letters shortly for those who have not paid and are not on a payment plan.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS

a. Architectural -- Director Ray said we received requests to alter the following: 2 replace garage doors, replace rotting fence, raised back side fence to 6 feet (not on golf course), moving gate across entry way and pour cement slab, install solar to back of house, paint a house the same color and trim and redo landscaping.

b. RV Park -- Director Kirby reported that he and

Ray Hallmark put down 400 pounds of pre-emergent in the park last month to combat the weeds. We also looked into adding another security camera but the cost outweighs that when you consider that hoodies hide the people so they can't be identified.

- c. Compliance -- Director Ray said the following issues were dealt with: 2 dogs loose without leashes, overgrown trees, bushes, possible rental before permitted time, 2 houses with underage residents, over 3 vehicles at property, trailer parked too long, noise and nuisance, and neighbor putting junk on another's property.
- d. Pool -- Director Simons said we are getting ready for summer and there will be more to report later.
- e. Library -- Director Tyner reported that the Library has received some good donations of new books from residents. Also, the Library has been rearranged to better show off its books and other items. She said many puzzles were donated recently to the school district which said it greatly appreciated them because autistic children especially enjoy working puzzles. The Library will continue to donate when it has extra or unneeded items.
- f. Special Projects -- Director Tyner said the board will work with the Social Club to put on the annual Ice Cream Social on June 14, Flag Day.
- g. Inside Maintenance -- Director Allen reported that we need to remove the elliptical in the Exercise Room because it is hard to use and is not a commercial model which is required by our insurance. It was donated to us. We would like to know if residents are interested in having a different elliptical machine before automatically replacing it.

Outside Maintenance -- Director Smale said we had had some paint vandalism around the Town Hall but it has been cleaned up. The perpetrator was caught.

VI. OLD BUSINESS

a. Town Hall Floors -- Directors Allen and Kirby reported that a recommendation regarding replacing the floor will be postponed until after they have time to study the different kinds of floors and all the costs.

b. Sheds -- Director Ray said a shed committee needs to be established so that new rules can be created to meet the city's shed requirements and also to better serve Kern City. He will gather information and share it starting next month.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

- a. Action for TOPS to Meet -- A request has been made from a resident to allow the TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly) group to meet weekly. The group's purpose is to help people lose weight healthfully and it will meet on Thursdays in the Community Room and be open to residents. Director Kirby moved to allow TOPS to meet here. Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- b. BBQ Use by Groups -- Director Parks said one of the groups that meets in Kern City would like to use the BBQ pit to make lunch occasionally. Director Ray moved to allow groups approved to meet here to use the pit if they make reservations in advance with the office and clean up the area immediately after use. Vote: Approved, unanimous.
- c. Action to Replace Exercise Equipment -- Discussed under Committee Reports. This will be deferred for more information.

VIII. PUBLIC FORM

- a. Directors Forum -- Director Kirby said our insurance agent will be invited to the next board meeting to discuss earthquake insurance.
- b. Social Club -- Member Fred Hufnagel reminded people who already had reservations to attend the Valentine's Dinner and said reservations were closed now. The Pancake Breakfast will be Feb. 17th from 8:00 to 9:30.
- c. Audience -- Some members spoke.

What happens in March?

The Healthy Geezer

Q. I'm having a devil of time controlling my bladder. Any suggestions?

About 10 percent of men and women over the age of 65 have trouble with bladder control, also know officially as urinary incontinence. Women suffer from this more than men.

During urination, muscles in the bladder contract, forcing urine into the urethra, a tube that carries urine out of the body. At the same time, muscles surrounding the urethra relax and let the urine pass. If the bladder muscles contract or the muscles surrounding the urethra relax without warning, the result is incontinence.

Short-term incontinence is caused by infections, constipation, and some medicines. If the problem persists, it might be caused by weak bladder muscles, overactive bladder muscles, blockage from an enlarged prostate, damage to nerves that control the bladder from diseases such as multiple sclerosis or Parkinson's.

In most cases urinary incontinence can be treated and controlled, if not cured. If you are having bladder control problems, go to your doctor. Doctors see this problem all the time, so there is no need to be embarrassed.

Your doctor may do a number of tests on your urine, blood and bladder. You may be asked to keep a daily chart about your urination.

There are several different types of urinary incontinence

- * If urine leaks when you sneeze, cough, laugh or put pressure on the bladder in other ways, you have "stress incontinence."
- * When you can't hold urine, you have "urge incontinence."
- * When small amounts of urine leak from a bladder that is always full, you have "overflow incontinence."
- * Many older people who have normal bladder control but have difficulty getting to the bathroom in time, have "functional incontinence."

There are many ways to treat urinary inconti-

nence. The method depends upon the type of problem.

You can train your bladder with exercises and biofeedback. You can also chart your urination and then empty your bladder before you might leak.

Your doctor has other tools he can use. There are urethral plugs and vaginal inserts for women with stress incontinence. There are medicines that relax muscles, helping the bladder to empty more fully during urination. Others tighten muscles in the bladder and urethra to cut down leakage.

Surgery can improve or cure incontinence if it is caused by a problem such as a change in the position of the bladder or blockage due to an enlarged prostate. Common surgery for stress incontinence involves pulling the bladder up and securing it. When stress incontinence is serious, the surgeon may use a wide sling. This holds up the bladder and narrows the urethra to prevent leakage.

Even if treatment is not fully successful, management of incontinence can help you feel more relaxed and comfortable about the problem.

Experts' latest findings about falls

Research studies offered new insights — and some surprises

Each year, one-third of people older than 65 will fall. Many of these seniors will suffer a fracture, brain damage or other debilitating injury. Each day, an average of 75 older adults will die from the effects of a fall. Falls cost our healthcare system upwards of \$30 billion every year.

This is an important topic, and the Caring Right at Home newsletter frequently reports on ways seniors can reduce their risk. We can't emphasize enough that seniors should remove fall hazards from their home, have regular eye exams, wear proper shoes, have their medications reviewed, get plenty of the right kind of exercise, wear their hearing aids, limit alcohol consumption, and talk to the doctor about ways to lower their personal risk factors. Read "The Rate of Senior Falls Is Not Falling" in the September 2017 issue of Caring Right at Home to find a good overview of these risk factors.

A recent Caring Right at Home poll asked readers if they had discussed fall prevention with their older loved ones. While most had done so, many indicated that the conversation had not gone well! Poorly worded discussions about the risk of falls can quickly put senior loved ones on the defensive, feeling as if their competence is being questioned.

For a change of strategy, how about talking about all the research that's happening on this topic? Make it a current-events discussion! Here are some of the new and sometimes surprising findings that can start a conversation while updating your own fall-prevention savvy.

1. Foot problems are a bigger risk factor than we thought.

In May 2017, researchers from Harvard School of Public Health noted that many factors could cause a fall — but if a senior falls again and again, sore feet or flat feet are often the cause. Said associate professor Marian Hannan, "We know that having more than one fall can be of concern. Many don't think of feet as the culprit. However, higher odds of recurrent falls were seen for those with

foot pain, especially severe foot pain, as well as those with planus foot posture [flat feet], indicating that both foot pain and foot posture may play a role in falls." Hannan's team says that treating foot problems could significantly reduce fall injuries and loss of independence among older adults.

2. A car crash can raise your risk of falling — and the reverse also is true.

Reduced body strength and flexibility, balance problems, and vision loss make a senior less safe both while driving and while walking. Falls and car accidents are further interrelated: When a senior has a car accident, resulting injuries and emotional trauma can raise their risk of falling. Coming full circle, in September 2017, experts from the AAA Foundation noted that senior drivers who have suffered a fall are then at higher risk of having a car crash, due to the effect of injuries and perhaps inactivity. Fall-protection classes and senior driving classes might be in order to lower the risk all around.

3. Middle-aged people who fall should schedule an eye exam.

In November 2017, University of Michigan researchers noted that while many people consider falls to be a problem exclusive to seniors, in fact, around 10 percent of people between the ages of 40 - 60 also will experience a serious fall. As assistant professor Carrie Karvonen-Gutierrez says, "Do we hit the magic number of 65 years old and suddenly become at risk for falls, whereas we are somehow immune before that? Certainly not." Karvonen-Gutierrez and her team believe that many of these falls are caused by treatable vision problems, such as nearsightedness. They hope to use this research to advocate for increased vision screening among younger

4. The role of medications is a complicated one.

A second University of Michigan

study, this one from May 2017, examined the relationship between depression, depression medications, and falls. The researchers noted that depression raises the risk of falls — but so do many of the medications often prescribed for older adults with depression. They urged doctors to carefully calibrate a senior's use of these medicines, and to choose nondrug treatments when possible. Another 2017 study, this one from Penn State University, noted that seniors who have poor sleep may get out of bed during the night, which can lead to a fall - yet if the doctor prescribes a sleep medication, that also increases the risk of falls. According to associate professor Orfeu Buxton, these medications "often have side effects that cause problems with balance, memory and situational awareness." Buxton suggests that nondrug approaches to sleep problems, which don't raise the risk of falls, also can be more effective.

5. It takes seniors only milliseconds longer to realize they're falling — but that makes a difference.

In October 2017, researchers from the University of Waterloo in Ontario noted that it takes seniors twice as long to realize they're falling, as compared to younger adults. Among a group of test subjects, younger adults took 44 milliseconds, while people older than 60 took twice as long — 88 milliseconds. That's less than one-tenth of a second, but, said kinesiology professor Michael Barnett-Cowan, "This lag means that by the time older adults realize they are falling, it's often too late for them to consciously do anything about it. These findings highlight both the importance of adequate assessment for older adults and the need to expedite new prevention technology."

6. Icy sidewalks don't top the hazard list.

Many seniors believe that their greatest risk of a serious fall injury is to slip on an icy surface during the cold days of winter. But they shouldn't let their guard down during summer or when they're indoors. An October 2017 study published by the American Society of Anesthesiologists analyzed the instance of hip fracture, one of the most serious consequences of falls. The data showed that, in fact, more than half of these fractures occurred during warmer months - and more than 75 percent happened indoors. Tripping over a throw rug and falling out of bed were the most common causes. Said study author Dr. Jason Guercio of the Hospital of Central Connecticut in New Britain, "Given the results of this study, it appears that efforts to decrease fall risk among the elderly living in cold climates should not be preferentially aimed at preventing outdoor fractures in winter, but should focus on conditions present throughout the year, and most importantly on mitigating indoor risk."

There is a lot we can do to lower our risk of falling. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that fewer than half of older adults tell their doctor they've fallen, but that information is definitely not something to skip during your next checkup! Talk about your fall history and your personal risk factors, and ask for a "prescription" for fall protection.

If your family uses home care to support the well-being of an older loved one, make fall prevention a priority.

A professional caregiver can keep the home free from hazards, and provide supervision and assistance during activities that could be dangerous, such as bathing, navigating stairways, or getting in and out of bed.

Caregivers support overall good health by preparing nutritious meals, taking clients to health appointments, and supervising exercise to promote improved strength and balance.

And though it's impossible to prevent all falls, families can rest easier knowing that if their loved one were to fall, a trained caregiver would be on hand to assist right away.

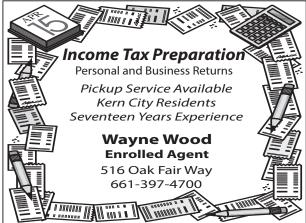
