Residents, check listings now to be in new directory

The office is preparing a new Kern City directory and, to make certain that it is as accurate as possible, is sending a letter to residents asking them to double-check their individual listing.

"At the end of last month, we began mailing out a letter that lists the name, address and phone number we have on file for each specific property," said Jennifer Neal Espinosa, office assistant. "We are asking that each resident quickly and carefully review all the information and if they want changes to mark the form and

bring or send it back to us by May 30.

"It's important to note that if we do not hear back from you after you receive your letter that we will assume your listing is correct as we have it," she said.

According to Neal Espinosa, not all residents will receive a letter. "If in the past residents had asked that they not appear in the directory, they may not receive a letter. However, if any residents have changed their minds and would now like to be listed, we'll be glad to list them,

President's Message

Gone fishing? No more! Fishing gone!

(and so are walking, biking and dogs running loose)

At our last board meeting, some members complained about children playing and people biking, walking and fishing on the golf course. One resident said that one of the people fishing said he had been told that it is okay to fish at night. Another resident became worried when she saw a child walking right in the path of players hitting golf balls. Another person saw bicyclists on the green.

We talked to Renae, the club's office manager, and she verified what we had been told in the past: People who are not golfing should not be walking on the course and fishing is NOT allowed at any time. Also, dogs should not be allowed to run free on the course.

Regarding fishing, she said there are two ponds on the golf course, and the Sundale Country Club buys and stocks fish in both ponds. Recently a "No Fishing" sign was dropped into the water so it is not visible. We understand that the club will be putting up new signs.

According to Renae, reasons why fishing is not allowed are: The club pays for the fish and when people take or kill them, it costs the club money; people who fish are trespassing and can be arrested; it can be dangerous because someone could be hit by a golf ball or people could slip and fall into the water; and residents who live on the golf course are very leery of non-golfers walking on the golf course and in-between houses.

Therefore, we would like to ask our residents to help by: Not walking on the greens or allowing visitors to do so, discouraging fishing and bicycling, and not letting dogs run free. Thank you all for your cooperation.

One last thing: If you haven't eaten at the country club's cafe downstairs, you might want to try it. Several of us eat there, and it is delicious. You do not even have to be a member of the club and you can order food to go. Be sure to cut out the coupon on this page if you go!



KERN CITY BOARD MEETINGS

D R A F T KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES April 9, 2019, 9:00 a.m.

I. CALL TO ORDER: Director Jolene Simons called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other directors present: Ray Hallmark, Steve Parks, Kyle Ray, Carol Ann Toms and Donna Tyner and Manager Jill Foley. Absent: Director Roger Kirby. Director Simons welcomed attendees, and member Terry Wiersum led the flag salute.

Announcements: President Simons said a recent article in the Bakersfield Californian newspaper reported that the prospective buyers of the Sundale Country Club had asked the City of Bakersfield if housing could be developed on the golf course. The Californian's reporter talked to Dr. Dhillon, the person representing the prospective buyers, and he said his group had asked about development opportunities, including housing. However, Dr. Dhillon said that after he talked to many people he recommended that the group not consider housing and instead make it a golf course as nice as some of the other very nice ones in town. We're still waiting to see when and if escrow closes.

There will be an executive board meeting immediately following this meeting for hearings with two properties with violations.

- II. MINUTES: Director Tyner. The March 12, 2019 board meeting minutes were accepted as presented.
- III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner reported that as of March 31, the Checking Account had \$324,384.06 and the Reserve Account had a balance of \$447,905.89.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Jill Foley. Any Klarion

classified ads and Letters to the Editor are due April 15. Condolences go to the loved ones of residents Winton Baker and Robert Greene.

Special Speakers: The 50-Plus group will speak on "Tax Tips: How to be better prepared for taxes next year" on Wednesday, April 24, from 5:30 to 6:30 pm in the Town Hall.

Driver Class: Judy Harris will lead another senior

driving class which can help reduce car insurance costs and bring seniors up to date on the latest driving safety information. It will be a complete course, not just a refresher, on April 13 and 20 from 9:00 to 1:00p.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS

- a. Architectural -- Director Ray reported that we approved the following requests: For a reroof of a house, two solar installations, and two re-landscaping jobs.
- b. Compliance -- Director Parks said we continue to correct violations and we are dealing with an underage property right now.
- c. RV/Garden -- Director Hallmark reported that the carpeting, shed and miscellaneous metal from the old garden area has been removed so we're moving toward creating more RV spaces. Unfortunately, someone snuck into the park and stole items from three vehicles and there was a door left open on a fourth vehicle. We notified everyone with a vehicle there to check their vehicle. No other problems were reported.
- d. Pool -- Director Simons said everything looks good at the pool and the solar will be turned back on as soon as we have warmer weather.
- e. Library -- Director Tyner reported that additional shelving is going in the Library to hold more books. There is also DirecTV available now if people want to check the news or some other program.
- f. Special Projects -- Director Toms reminded residents that the Volunteer Luncheon will be on Oct. 22 and the Klarion will start promoting it in July.
- g. Inside Maintenance -- Director Toms said the committee that is choosing paint and flooring for the Town Hall is hard at work, and a designer from a paint company will visit the Town Hall and give recommendations on the changes. Because of the work to be done, the Town Hall will be closed May 28 to June 21.

The new recumbent bike is in the Exercise Room now. The old one was removed because someone hit the console and broke it. We ask that people treat the equipment like it is their own, and if there is a problem with it to please report that to the office asap.

h. Outside Maintenance -- Director Hallmark

reported that additional topping has been added to the fence behind the activities wing to stop the people who were climbing over the back fence to use the women's restroom to take showers.

VI. OLD BUSINESS: Nothing to report.

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

Action on Office Computers -- Director Ray said the three office computers are getting older and all have components that are different ages and from different companies. It would be a good idea to replace them so they're all working with the same equipment and able to easily network with each other. Director Simons said she found a program from Dell Computers that will sell refurbished computers for as little as \$175. Directors decided to do further research.

VIII. AUDIENCE

a. Social Club - Terry Wiersum said a free movie, A Star is Born, will be shown for free today at 2:00 pm in the Town Hall, and there will also be free popcorn. The 2nd Friday Potluck Lunch on April 12 at noon. It's free -- Just bring a dish to share. First-timers don't need to bring anything. Immediately following the potluck on April 12 at 2:00 pm, our resident author will be in the Library introducing her new book. It's free and there will be refreshments. The Pancake Breakfast on April 20 will feature those delicious pancakes and sausages plus an egg casserole. The Potato Bake Dinner will be on April 25, and before Memorial Day, on May 21, there will be a tri-tip dinner and veterans will be free.

b. Audience -- Members raised concerns about people, including children, walking, bicycling and fishing on the golf course. The office will check with the Sundale Country Club to see if it will put the No Fishing sign back up at the pond. IX. ADJOURNMENT: President Simons adjourned the meeting at 10:00 a.m.

FOOD BANK HELP FOR ELIGIBLE SENIORS -- The Community Action Partnership of Kern County has a food program that benefits low-income seniors. It is USDA-funded and provides low-income seniors with a 30-lb box of healthy food items such as milk, cereal, protein, fruits and vegetables each month. To apply, a senior must be 60 years of age or older, a Kern County resident, and must meet the guidelines below:

To apply, a senior must just show up at one of the food distribution centers and have a valid photo I.D. (driver's license, passport, etc.), and proof of address, such as a utility bill, rental agreement, etc.

To see which food distribution center to go to and on what date, dial 2-1-1 which is a county phone number. After the recording is over and the operator comes on the line, ask where you can go to the CAP senior food program and on what date and time.

1. The Kern City Swimming Pool, Locker Rooms and entire pool area are for the use of Kern City members/residents and their Guests only. Members/residents must accompany their Guests.

2. ALL PERSONS USING THE POOL AND OTHER FACILITIES DO SO AT THEIR OWN RISK. LIFEGUARD SERVICES ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

- 3. An Association resident or member must accompany his or her Guest(s) and must have a pool key card.
 - 4. All residents entering the Pool area must enter with their pool key card. Residents in good standing may pick up a card in the office for a deposit.
- 5. All persons <u>MUST take a shower</u> before entering the Swimming Pool even if they showered before arriving.

HOURS

 Swimming Pool hours for Members and Guests over 18: Monday through Friday – 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
 Saturday and Sunday – 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Note: Early morning exercisers are permitted except during pool cleaning from 7:30 to 9:00 a.m. on Mondays -- or on Tuesday after a three-day holiday weekend -- and Aquasize classes.

Hours for all Guests <u>under 18 years of age</u> (who must be with a resident) are: DAILY: 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., PLUS Saturday 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

- 7. Children under 3 years of age are not permitted in the Pool.

- 14. MEMBERS WHO REFUSE, OR FAIL TO CONFORM TO, THESE RULES MAY LOSE THEIR RIGHT TO THE USE OF THESE FACILITIES FOR THE BALANCE OF THE YEAR.

"All members and residents are welcome to use the pool as long as they don't have any outstanding violations and follow the pool rules," she said. "Children over 3 are welcome between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. daily and 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Saturdays. "Also, guests are welcome as long as the resident accompanies them."

Pool users must get a pass from the office to

enter the pool area. There is a deposit required and it is returned when residents turn the pass back in. The cost is \$10 for property owners and \$30 for renters. A lost pass will cost \$30 to replace.

The pool rules are posted at the pool and in this newspaper. "We really appreciate residents abiding by the rules, and we hope the pool will help make their summer a fun one." Simons noted.

Do you know these driving tips?

At the class she led in Kern City last month, Judy Harris shared information about some of the rules of the road that seniors may not be aware of or know have changed. So that all residents will be informed, she shared the following:

- The DMV no longer recommends holding your hands on the steering wheel at 10 and 2 o'clock. It now recommends holding the wheel at 9 and 3 o'clock.
- The amount of space between a driver's chest and the front air bag in the steering wheel should be 10 inches.
- A driver should have a clear line of sight through the front window so s/ he can see at least 3 inches above the steering wheel. Steering wheels and

seats can be adjusted to accomplish this.

• Leaving a safe distance behind the vehicle in front of you used to be measured differently but is now measured by time. The DMV recommends watching the vehicle ahead of you and when it passes a fixed point like a telephone pole start counting "one thousand one," "one thousand two," "one thousand three" so that at least three seconds go by before you pass the same fixed point. That provides you with a safe cushion if that vehicle slams on its brakes or has an accident. Counting four or five seconds behind is better if you're driving in bad weather.


