D R A F T KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES

Nov. 12, 2019, 5:30 p.m. In Town Hall Del Webb Room

I. CALL TO ORDER: Director Jolene Simons called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. Other directors present: Ray Hallmark, Roger Kirby, Steve Parks, Kyle Ray, and Donna Tyner and Manager Jill Foley. Absent: Carol Ann Toms. Director Simons welcomed attendees, and member Fred Hufnagel led the flag salute.

Announcements: President Simons reported the following: 1) The auction for the Sundale Country Club was postponed again, this time to Nov. 18 at 10:00 a.m. If we learn that anyone wants to build housing on the golf course, we will fight that. 2) There was an Executive Board Meeting last week to consider contracts regarding eradicating termites.

- II. MINUTES: Director Tyner. Director Tyner moved that the Oct. 8, 2019 board meeting minutes be accepted as presented. Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner reported that as of Oct. 31, the Checking Account had \$159,891.17 and the Reserve Account had a balance of \$302,002.80. Also, there is \$100,501.15 in a CD which is part of Reserves.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Jill Foley. Any Klarion classified ads and Letters to the Editor are due tomorrow because we have to publish early since this is a holiday month. We learned of the passing of Brad Amerine, Jim and Joyce Black and Joan Martin.

V. OLD BUSINESS:

- a. Action on Budget -- Director Tyner reported that the draft 2020 Budget had been mailed out to members for comment over a month ago. A few members said they were glad there would be no increase in the annual assessment. She moved to accept the budget. Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- b. Action on Revised RV Contract -- Director Kirby explained that the contract has been strengthened to ensure that commercial vehicles, especially semi rigs, and non-vehicles can't park there. He moved to accept the contract as revised. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

- a. Action on Purchasing Gravel for RV Park
 -- Director Kirby said additional gravel is needed
 for the RV Park at approximately \$900. Director
 Parks moved to make the purchase. Vote: Passed,
 unanimous.
- b. Action on Selling Lawnmower -- Director Simons. Tabled to research further.
- c. Action on Termite Contract -- Director Ray said we learned at the last minute that the company with the best bid would be unable to do something we requested so we need more time to research an exterminator. Therefore, the issue will be deferred.

VIII. AUDIENCE:

The Public Forum will be postponed to the meeting immediately following.

IX. ADJOURNMENT: President Simons adjourned the meeting at 5:37 p.m.

Nov. 12, 2019, immediately following regular board meeting that began at 5:30 p.m.
In Town Hall Del Webb Room

- I. CALL TO ORDER: Jolene Simons, President, opened the meeting at 6:00 p.m. and welcomed members. Other directors present were Ray Hallmark, Roger Kirby, Steve Parks, Kyle Ray, and Donna Tyner and Manager Jill Foley. Absent: Carol Ann Toms.
- II. ANNOUNCEMENT: Director Simons reminded members that there would be no election because there were no proposed changes to the bylaws, restrictions or rules and the number of candidates equaled the number of openings on the board of directors.

III. REPORT OF THE ACTIVITIES, FINAN-CIAL CONDITION OF THE ASSOCIATION: All Directors: President Simons reported that the

association's finances are in good condition. We managed to hold down costs and increase our Reserve Account so that it met the amount our Reserve Study requires for 2019 which is \$371,977. In fact, with our CD we exceed that amount. We will also have money left over to put more into Reserves next year and replace what we used this year for updating the Town Hall.

She said that the main accomplishments this year included: Updating the Town Hall with new paint, flooring and drapes; increasing security with additional fencing and new cameras in our common area and RV Park; purchasing two new air conditioning units; and adding six new spaces in our RV Park.

President Simons said that our RV Park is full and may be the best looking storage park around. She thanked Directors Roger Kirby and Ray Hallmark for all their hard work.

She also announced that members' Annual Policy package and assessment bills will be going out in a week and so will invoices for those who have RV spaces. All bills are due Jan. 1 and late on Jan. 16. For payment plans, arrange those with the office early -- before Jan. 16.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

RV Park -- Director Kirby reported the park is full and looks great. He thanked Director Hallmark for his help.

Outside Maintenance -- Director Hallmark reported that we replaced lights along the wall between the Town Hall and the Activities wing with LED lights. Water from the roof had leaked into the old outside lights and now they're repaired. Now we have to fix the light that shines on the flag because it's too low. We had most of our trees trimmed and we're going to have the rest trimmed this month. Value Roofing will repair our flat roof over the walkway in front of the Town Hall where water has caused wood rot. A truck from Spectrum decided to cut through our property on Pebble Beach and ran over our chain and onto our lawn. Then it got stuck and made a hole in our grass trying to become unstuck. Director Kirby purchased sand and

filled in the hole and Spectrum will pay us back. Compliance -- Director Parks said we're still dealing with some owners who have dirt yards. We also dealt with an RV parked longer than three days.

Architectural -- Director Ray reported that we approved the following: 1 installation of a new roof, 1 solar installation, 2 painting houses, 1 adding a fence, 2 improving landscaping, 1 adding concrete, and 1 replacing windows with dual panes. He explained that we must have a local association's approval before we can approve a condo's architectural request. For solar the local associations need to ensure their roofs can handle solar and they often require that owners agree to pay for any damage to the roofs.

Pool -- President Simons said the solar is off because it doesn't really heat the pool now that it's cooler but the pool is open for all Kern City polar bears. Special Projects -- Director Tyner reported that the Volunteer Lunch was delicious and the entertainment by the children from Bessie Owens School was outstanding.

Library -- Director Tyner noted that the Library is now donating any unneeded books in good condition to Christmas for Seniors because that group likes to include a book with the packages it delivers to needy seniors. She thanked people for donating good new books and invited residents to stop in and work on the Christmas puzzles which are out now

IV: PUBLIC FORUM:

Social Club -- Member Fred Hufnagel announced the Pancake Breakfast on Nov. 16 from 8:00 to 9:30 a.m. will be free to Kern City veterans. For residents who will be alone on Thanksgiving, there will be a Thanksgiving Lunch for free in the Town Hall. People must RSVP by Nov. 22 at 2:00 p.m. so that there will be enough food.






