

## Covid 19: How to avoid it

Since the Covid 19 virus in Kern County was at its highest at the time the Klarion went to press, we thought it might be helpful to remind people how to stay safe. The following information is from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).

The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.



The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).

### President's message

It's been a busy few months even though the coronavirus has kept many people at home. Of course, the biggest issue directors have had to deal with has been deciding on when to open the facilities.

The board has been torn between trying to reduce the opportunity for the virus to spread and satisfying those residents who have been anxiously awaiting the opening of the pool and the rest of the facilities.

The good news is that some areas are open. First, the Library is now open Monday, Wednesday and Friday between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. A monitor will be there to ensure people are social distancing, and we ask that people wear masks and use the hand sanitizer in the Library. Also, the Woodshop is open and there is a hand sanitizer in there. We ask that people use the sanitizer before and after using the area.

We also expect that the Sunday services for the church will be open by the end of June. There will be strict guidelines and monitors to ensure people do not get near one another, and we require that all attendees wear face masks.

Please note: It is very important that if you are sick or don't feel well, that you do not visit our facilities.

We'd love to have everything open but at this time (press time was mid-June -- Ed.), the virus numbers are at the highest they've ever been in our county. Plus we're still waiting on the county's environmental health department to see when we can open the pool and what the restrictions will be. We'll have to meet any and all governmental requirements.

Please know that directors are trying our best to serve you, and more of our facilities may be open by July 1 even if we didn't know in time to include them in this column.

To see what is open in July, please check the glass case on the street side of the Town Hall.

## **Check doors and windows**

A word to the wise: Check all your doors and windows and ensure they cannot be easily broken into. Last month a man broke into a condo on Yorba Linda through a bedroom window at around 9:00 p.m. on a Sunday. He demanded money and kept saying "Where's your money, I need money now!" He was covered head to toe so he could not be identified. The police were called and came right away. The thief cut through a screen to get inside.

In this warmer weather, it is easy to leave windows open because there are screens, but if the screens could easily be cut, an intruder can enter. Make sure your windows aren't "open doors" for intruders.

Remember, Kern City is safer than most areas but the police have said that there is no area that is completely safe. So check all around your property and make it hard for thieves!

#### **Prevent Heat Stress Illness**

Editor's Note: The following information is printed courtesy of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Heat-related illnesses or death are preventable if you follow a few simple steps.

- Stay in an air-conditioned area during the hottest hours of the day. If you don't have air conditioning in your home, go to a public place such as a shopping mall or a library to stay cool. Cooling stations and senior centers are also available in many large cities for people of all ages.
  - Wear light, loose-fitting

clothing.

- Drink water often. Don't wait until you are thirsty.
- Avoid unnecessary hard work or activities if you are outside or in a building without air-conditioning.
- Avoid unnecessary sun exposure. When in the sun, wear a hat, preferably with a wide brim.
- Air conditioning is the strongest protective factor against heat-related illness. Exposure to air conditioning for even a few hours a day will reduce the risk for heat-related illness.

That's through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.

These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.

Some recent studies have suggested that Covid-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.

#### Wash your hands often

Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.

If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

#### **Avoid close contact**

Avoid close contact with people who are sick, even inside your home. If possible, maintain 6 feet between the person who is sick and other household members.

Put distance between yourself and other people outside of your home.

Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.

Stay at least 6 feet from other people.

Keeping distance from others (about 2 arms' length) is especially important for people who are at higher risk of getting very sick.

Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others.

You could spread Covid-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.


Everyone should wear a cloth face cover when they have to go out in public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.

Do NOT use a face mask meant for a healthcare worker.

Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.



#### Cover coughs and sneezes

If you are around others and do not have on your cloth face covering, remember to always cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow and do not spit.

#### Throw used tissues in the trash.

Immediately wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

#### Clean and disinfect

Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily. This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.

If surfaces are dirty, clean them. Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.

Then, use a household disinfectant. Most common EPA-registered household disinfectants will work.

#### **Monitor Your Health**

Be alert for symptoms. Watch for fever, cough, shortness of breath, or other symptoms of Covid-19.

Especially important if you are running essential errands, going into the office or workplace, and in settings where it may be difficult to keep a physical distance of 6 feet.

Take your temperature if symptoms develop.

Don't take your temperature within 30 minutes of exercising or after taking medications that could lower your temperature, like acetaminophen.

Follow CDC guidance if symptoms develop.

## **KERN CITY BOARD MINUTES**

DRAFT KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES June 9, 2020, 9:00 a.m. Via conference call due to coronavirus

I. CALL TO ORDER: President Steve Parks called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other directors present: Buster Beebe, Joe Newton, Kyle Ray, Jolene Simons (who checked in then had to immediately leave the call), Carol Ann Toms, and Donna Tyner (who left the meeting at 9:36 a.m.), and Administrative Assistant Jennifer Neal Espinosa (sitting in for the manager). Director Parks welcomed attendees. No Flag salute.

Announcements: President Parks reported that Bill Allen resigned from the board for medical reasons and member Joe Newton graciously accepted his board position. Since Bill was vice president, Director Beebe nominated Joe Newton for vice president. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

II. MINUTES: There were no changes to the May 12, 2020 board meeting minutes so President Parks declared that the minutes be accepted as presented. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Parks reported that as of May 31, the Checking Account had \$269,608.71 and the Reserve Account had a balance of \$447,670.97. The CD Account had a balance of \$103,690.81 at 1.24% interest and is up July 17th so we will decide to renew at that time. Director Ray noted that the CD is part of Reserves and requested that a total balance of all accounts be announced from now on. Director Tyner agreed.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Steve Parks for Manager Jill Foley. We have collected 99% of annual dues, which includes people who are making monthly payments. Director Parks thanked the office staff for keeping up with the monies.

#### V. REOPENING FACILITIES

a. Pool – President Steve Parks said the Governor and County have not yet approved opening pools, but that will change June 12, 2020. We will have to abide with any required restrictions before we can make a decision to open the pool. The question will be how we will move forward since we do not have a dedicated staff at the

pool. We do not have to have a formal meeting to open up. According to the news the virus cases have only gone up and there are more deaths. The manager has tried to find hands-free sanitizing stations but they are currently unavailable until the end of July or August.

- b. Church Director Parks opened discussion regarding allowing the church to meet in the Town Hall again. The following points were made:
- After church is over employee(s) must come in and sanitize everything.
- The government recommended that people age 65 and over observe services from home but President Parks noted that the states have left that up to personal choice so he'll leave that up to the board.
- Director Newton said the church cannot be over 25% of capacity.
- Director Ray suggested that only residents should be able to participate, no outside members.
- Director Ray suggested waiting on the opening until the county releases more virus statistics later in the month.
- Director Ray noted that some directors should meet with the Pastor and/or church leaders, and President Parks agreed so that the church leaders could hear and agree to the restrictions.

Director Beebe moved that the church be allowed to reopen on June 28, 2020 subject to fulfillment of the following guidelines: Attendees' temperatures must be taken, masks must be worn, hands must be sanitized before entering the Town Hall and people must be seated six feet apart unless they are family. In addition there must be no hand shaking, passing books or collection plates, singing, or choir. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

c. Library -- Director Parks said a hand sanitizing area and restrictions will be required. Joe Newton moved to open the Library with social distancing, masks, limited hours and a maximum of 5 people at one time. There will also be a volunteer to monitor the facility. Date for reopening is expected to be Monday June 15, 2020 but Director Tyner will have to approve dates and hours. Director Beebe moved to open the Library but to wait until Director Tyner chooses the final opening dates and hours. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

- d. Woodshop -- President Parks noted there are usually only 1 to 2 people in there at a time. Hand sanitizing will be available and required. Director Ray moved to open the woodshop on June 15, 2020. Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- e. Exercise Room -- Due to the difficulty in keeping the equipment clean, President Parks said he was not in favor of opening the Exercise Room yet. Director Ray moved to leave it closed for the time being. Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- f. Swimming Pool Director Newton noted that the pool is subject to the guidelines of the Governor and the County. Our pool is Private although the county calls it "Public" due to its size. But it is still a private pool. Director Newton said he would like to see what other facilities like ours are doing and he moved to leave the pool closed at this time, Vote: Passed, unanimous.
- g. Pool Room Director Ray discussed opening the pool room, remove card tables and let people use the pool table. Jennifer Neal Espinosa (sitting in for the manager) pointed out that would require leaving the gates to all the activity rooms unlocked so there was no motion to open the Pool Room at this time.
- VI. SOCIAL CLUB: Member Fred Hufnagel reported there will be a free pancake breakfast on Saturday, June 20, 2020 from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and will include 2 pancakes, 2 sausages and potatoes. It will be a drive-through to receive the packaged breakfast to take home to enjoy, and many safety precautions will be taken.

VII. AUDIENCE: Director Carol AnnToms reminded the audience that there will be a Flag Day Parade starting at 9:00 a.m. in the parking lot and all are invited to join.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT -- President Parks adjourned the meeting at 10:02 a.m.

Our hours right now are Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. We're looking forward to seeing everyone again.



**Danny Combs:** "I learned to watch TV six hours a day."

#### Scott Ames, retired firefighter:

"An unplanned disaster can occur at any time. Everyone should have extra food in their pantry and freezer, water, cash, gas in their vehicles, and ideally a generator. One needs to be prepared for 3 days after an emergency, but the reality is it could be longer."

**Tammy Plowman:** "Family togetherness has been enhanced."

**Darlene Spoor:** "Through all this God has directed me and given me the faith to believe He is in

control of all things, even though we may not understand. In addition, a positive outcome is that more people are attending church because it has been virtual."

**Maureen Jones:** "I've learned not to take for granted seeing friends and being able to go places."

Joe Newton: "It's important to be prepared but also to be judicious about reacting to emergencies and to learn from others' mistakes. For example, don't panic and go overboard in buying way too much. One person bought 3,400 rolls of toilet paper. Later he found he could not return them and he was unsuccessful trying to

sell them."

**Linda Lowe:** "People misunderstand that a mask is worn as a courtesy to protect others in case you are a carrier. It is courteous to others to wear your mask."

**Judy Couch:** "I learned that I enjoy my own company."

Wendy Amerine: "I've learned to be content, because I know who is in charge, and it ain't me! I also found out my hair looks good longer and grayer."

**Anonymous by request:** "I've learned that I hate my family. They're annoying."

**Steve Parks:** "I've learned that while some people are kinder, others are grumpier. The Kern City office and I have never had so many complaints and cantankerous people."

Jill Foley: "It's true that the office has had many more complaints, but we've also had some love. Thank you so much to Virginia Pounds for the beautiful flowers and Buster Beebe for the pizza!"

**Scott Ford:** "We learned to wash our hands more and be more careful. My wife also ordered face masks. Now what do I do with 100 masks?"



## Resident shares where to get help dealing with depression, stress

Kern City resident Ellen Eggert visited the office recently to remind those in the Kern City community about services that are available to seniors who may desire help to stay healthy or to combat stress or depression.

According to Eggert, who is program supervisor for Kern Behavioral Health and Recovery Services (BHRS), the county has different programs available, some of which are free and others which may be covered by health insurance

"During this period of Covid-19, we want to be certain that people know we have programs to not only help keep seniors stay healthy but also programs to deal with depression," she said. "Because the virus has dragged on, some people have thoughts of suicide, and we want them to know that there are people who want to help them."

Eggert said that it's okay to feel uncertainty, stress and anxiety but recommended not letting those feelings take over.

"I hope that residents who are struggling will call our crisis hotline and talk to the compassionate people who man the phones. It's anonymous and free," she said. "The number is 1-800-991-5272."

She also noted that there is a suicide hotline available at 1-800-273-8255.

For seniors age 60 and over, the county also has a Volunteer Senior Outreach Program which helps those who are housebound, have a limited support system and/or family support or have experienced significant loss. Volunteers will contact those people and help them stay active, develop a purpose in life and maintain their mental stimulation. The number to call for that service is

868-5021.

Eggert also shared tips and resources for dealing with this period of Covid-19. Those include:

Reduce your risk (See the tips from the CDC starting on page 1). Develop a care plan

This is key to being prepared.

The plan should include your health conditions, medications, healthcare providers, emergency contacts and end-of-life care options.


You can put your plan together with your doctor, home nurse aide or family member.


