DRAFT KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES

May 13, 2025, 9:00 a.m.

The meeting will be videotaped and recorded. The tape recording will be erased after the minutes are done.

I. CALL TO ORDER:

- **a. Welcome:** President Seymour called the meeting to order at 9:03 a.m. Other directors present: Buster Beebe, Kelley Lee, Ilene Schechter, Darryl Slavin, Donna Tyner and Jill Wolf and Manager Jill Foley. President Seymour welcomed attendees, and John Lopez led the flag salute.
- b. Announcements: President Seymour welcomed everyone to the meeting. He said there would be an Executive Board Meeting tomorrow to discuss the room rental contract and whether renters should supply event insurance. He stated KCCA's insurance agent would be happy if KCCA had that requirement, especially if alcohol will be served. Manager Foley said event insurance is usually reasonable and sometimes even free on someone's homeowner's insurance. President Seymour stated event insurance is inexpensive, usually not more than \$100.

On May 29th there will be another Executive Board Meeting for a hearing regarding dogs running loose. He reminded people that dogs must be on a leash or confined in a yard. They are not allowed to run on the golf course or chase golfers.

- **II. MINUTES:** Director Tyner asked if there were any corrections to the April 11, 2025 minutes. There were none so the minutes were accepted as presented.
- III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner reported that as of April 30, 2025, the Checking Account had \$29,467.25. There is \$370,944.27 of the checking account money in a Money Market Account and \$135,353.18 of our reserve in a CD at Mechanics Bank. Therefore, the total in Mechanics Bank as of May 30, 2025 was \$535,934.70.

At Valley Strong there is \$102,332.22 in a Money Market account. In Alta One there is \$272,624.19 in an interest-earning CD. Between the three banking institutions there is \$910,891.11.

Director Tyner reminded everyone that last month the board approved moving \$230,000 from the CD in Mechanics Bank and put into a 4.1% Money Market account at Edward Jones.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Manager Foley reported the deadline to turn in Letters to the Editor or classified ads for the *Klarion* is Thursday, May 15th, by noon for the June paper. On June 11th at 6:00 p.m. there will be a community meeting with the police in the Town Hall to talk about crime and get input from the residents about their needs. Light refreshments will be served. The office learned of the passing of Nadra Halterman and Helvethia Hopkins.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- a. Pool -- Director Lee reported the pool is 70 degrees and looks good. The afternoon Aquasize will start May 19th each weekday from 4:00 5:00 p.m. with Nancy McMasters and Scott Ford leading the class. The morning Aquasize will start the first Monday in June and will be held Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:00 10:00 a.m. Dianne Hufnagel will lead the class.
- **b. Inside Maintenance** -- Director Wolf said the TV has been mounted on the wall in the Conference Room and that room is being painted. The stage will be painted on May 31st. Rooms in the Activities Building will be reviewed for updates after the Walla Reserve Study is completed so the Board has a better idea of what needs immediate attention. She also thanked her gardening group for all their work. President Seymour stated every three years there is a physical inspection of the property as part of the Reserve Study, and the study is updated the other two years with information provided by KCCA. This year was the physical inspection, and when the study is completed, we will know how much money is needed in Reserves this year. President Seymour also said there was also a meeting with the insurance agent who felt a pickleball court would not affect KCCA's insurance.
- **c.** Compliance Director Wolf stated she and Director Schechter drive around once or twice a month to check on compliance issues, and if a property is not in compliance either they or the

office will give the homeowner a call. Manager Foley will send out a letter if necessary. Director Wolf asked residents to contact her if they know of any compliance issues.

- d. Outside Maintenance Director Slavin said a water pipe was leaking in the pool area by the men's restroom and has been repaired. The air conditioner for the library was making a noise and Grogan Mechanical fixed the problem. Director Slavin stated a part of the chain link fence by the woodshop was broken and it has been repaired. President Seymour said the water pipe was a pressured water line that was used for the spa that used to be in the pool area. Since it was not a working line it was capped off, all for over \$300, which included cutting up the concrete around the pipe.
- e. RV Storage -- Director Beebe reported the RV Storage looks great, and he still can't find a weed. He thanked President Seymour, Director Wolf, Daryl Wolf and Jennifer Neal, from the office, for all their help. He stated he and Daryl Wolf fixed the lock for the walk-in gate. Open and Shut came out to do maintenance and did not find any problems with the gate or motor.
- **f. Special Projects** Director Tyner said the 'Early Bird' dinner is May 23rd from 4:00 6:00 p.m. in the 19th Hole and will be chicken piccata pasta, salad, bread and butter for \$15.95 with reservations by May 22nd. Without reservations the dinner is \$17.95. The Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon will be May 16th for those volunteers who turned in their hours. The Ice Cream Social will be on July 24th and will be a 60's themed ice cream social. The Shred Event will be on June 6th from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. in the parking lot. It's free, but if desired, residents will be able to donate to the Honor Flight for veterans.
- **g.** Library -- Director Tyner stated she is looking for newer books to be donated. She encouraged residents to come in to work the puzzle, be on the computer or read a book since it's nice and cool in the library.
- h. Local Associations Director Schechter stated she, President Seymour and Director Wolf are attending Local Association meetings. She request-



The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently offered tips to help seniors especially stay safe when it's hot and there are mosquitoes around. See their tips here.

CDC Tips to avoid heat and mosquitos

From the Centers for Disease Control Steps to protect yourself from high heat:

Stay in an air-conditioned indoor location as much as you can.

Drink plenty of fluids even if you don't feel thirsty. Schedule outdoor activities carefully.

Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing and sunscreen.

Pace yourself.

Take cool showers or baths to cool down.

* Check on a friend, neighbor or relative and have someone do the same for you! Never leave children or pets in cars.

From the Environmental Protection Agency **Preventing Mosquito Bites**

Take steps to protect yourself and your family from mosquito bites that can make you sick.

Wear loose-fitting, long-sleeved shirts and pants. Wear clothing and gear treated with permethrin. Control mosquitoes indoors and outdoors. Avoid puddles of water, and report them.

Use proven EPA-registered insect repellents. When used as directed, EPA-registered insect repellents are proven safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women. They include products with DEET; Picaridin (known as KBR 3023 and icaridin outside the United States); IR3535; and Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE)—A plant-based product.

Residents, if you see puddles of standing water, please let the office know and provide the address where you see that. Office staff will try to locate the person(s) responsible and get them to stop the



I'd like to take this opportunity to update the 17 condo association residents and the Kern City community of the educational and informative opportunities the KCAI Board has offered this past year. KCAI publishes a newsletter to any resident in Kern City (if interested, please provide KCAI with your email address) with updates and feedback on the workshops we conduct and the Davis Sterling Act and state of California laws that change affecting our HOA's.

POOL RULES

The Pool Rules changed in August 2024 to eliminate children's hours on Saturday nights. Now the children's hours are everyday from 10:00am to 2:00pm.

Pool area is NON-smoking

- 1. The Kern City Swimming Pool, Locker Rooms and entire pool area are for the use of Kern City members/residents and their Guests only. Members/residents must accompany their Guests.
- 2. ALL PERSONS USING THE POOL AND OTHER FACILITIES DO SO AT THEIR OWN RISK.

LIFEGUARD SERVICES ARE <u>NOT</u> AVAILABLE.

- 3. An Association resident or member must accompany his or her Guest(s) and must have a pool key card.
 - All residents entering the Pool area must enter with their pool key card. Do not open the gate for someone or allow someone to enter behind you. They must use their own key.
 - Residents in good standing may pick up a card in the office for a deposit.

HOURS

Swimming Pool hours for Members and Adult Guests over 18:

- Monday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- Saturday and Sunday 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- Note: Early morning exercisers are permitted except during pool cleaning from 7:30 to 9:00 a.m. on Monday/ Wednesday/Friday (or on Tuesday after a three-day holiday weekend) or during Aquasize classes.

Hours for all Guests between the ages of 3-18 (who must be with a resident) are:

- Sundays through Fridays: 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and
- Saturdays: from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Swimming Pool even if they showered before arriving

- 4. No child under 3 years of age will be permitted in the Pool.
- 5. Absolutely <u>NO DIAPERS</u> (children's or adult's) in pool.
- 6. Rafts, balls and toys are not permitted in the Pool Area. Fins, Snorkels and Safety Aids are permitted.

- 7. Games, Stunts, Running, Diving, jumping in and all types of horseplay are prohibited in the Pool and Pool area.
- 8. Foods and Beverages of any kind are not allowed in the pool area. No glass or breakable plastic is allowed in the pool area. Ice chests and other containers with food are NOT allowed in the pool area.
- 9. Oils and lotions are <u>not</u> permitted in the Pool area or Pool.
- 10. Waterproof sunscreen is allowed but must be dry on the skin before getting into the pool.
- 11. Pets are not permitted in the Pool area at any time.
- 12. Nudity and partial nudity are not allowed in the pool or pool area, and only swimming attire no street clothes (except for sun protection) are allowed in the pool. Also, please don't wear jewelry into the pool.
- 13. MEMBERS WHO REFUSE, OR FAIL TO CONFORM TO, THESE RULES MAY LOSE THEIR RIGHT TO THE USE OF THESE FACILITIES WITH A FIRST TIME OFFENSE OF 30 DAYS.

ed the Local Associations provide her with updated Reserve studies, updated bylaws, any change to HOA Board members or any change in monthly dues. Carol Ann Toms, the President of KCAI, stated KCAI will hold a Vendor Expo on August 23 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Town Hall and will be open to all the residents of Kern City. The Vendor Expo will consist of painters, repair people, etc., and residents can contact Carol Ann Toms if they know anyone who would be interested in being a vendor at the Expo.

VI. OLD BUSINESS: None

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

a. Action of Renewing CD – Director Tyner reported the CD at Alta One matured on May 10th and the Board needs to vote on what to do with the money before the grace period is up. Currently the CD is \$272,624.17. Of that, \$12,375.81 is earned interest from 2024 that will be put into the operations account at Mechanics Bank. She would like to put \$230,000 of the Reserve money into a 6-month Money Market account in South State Bank of Winter Haven, FL, through Edward Jones, which will earn 4.2%.

She would like to put the \$30,000 remaining from the Reserves and the \$30,000 allocated to the Reserves in the 2025 budget, for a total of \$60,000, into a 9-month CD in the Huntington National Bank out of Columbus, OH, through Edward Jones, earning 4.10%. Director Tyner made a motion to make all those changes. She stated that by keeping all the accounts under \$230,000, even with the interest earned, they will be in-

sured by the FDIC. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

b. Action on Repairing

Concrete – President
Seymour stated he was
getting bids to fix the uneven concrete that the insurance company says
is a liability. He has only received
one bid at this time so will push this
agenda item aside. If he gets the bid
by tomorrow's executive board meeting he will bring it up then. President
Seymour said they are also looking
at the concrete where the pickleball
court will be placed and what repairs

there will cost.

Director Wolf mentioned the room where donated medical equipment is kept is getting very full. Director Tyner said she found a place that will take equipment and donate them to people who can't afford to buy them, and Joe Newton had been asked to help deliver the equipment to them. KCCA will keep some items for residents to borrow.

IX. AUDIENCE:

Social Club: Terry Wiersum, President of the Social Club, said the first hot dog event sold 48 hot dogs with chips and a drink for \$5. The next event is May 18 from 12:30 – 2:00 p.m. On May 24th there will be a pancake breakfast for \$8. Eggs weren't mentioned because of the high cost of eggs but there are other delicious foods.

Members: An audience member asked what the office is doing about a home not in compliance with the yard. Director Tyner said it is being addressed, and the office is monitoring it. President Seymour stated Directors Schechter and Wolf are driving around at least once a month looking at properties not in compliance. He stated the office keeps a list

of properties and is following up on them. In some cases, Kern City pays for the yard maintenance then bills the homeowner or the estate for the cost. Director Schechter stated she is keeping an ongoing list and documents about what they are doing and what still needs to be done. Manager Foley stated it costs between \$300-\$500 on average to clean up a property. A member reminded everyone that due to drought conditions homeowners can let their lawns die, but they still need to be maintained. Residents were asked to be mindful of a man

in a truck driving up to women and talking to them.

X. ADJOURNMENT – President Seymour adjourned the meeting at 9:48 a.m. The next meeting will be on June 10, 2025 at 5:30 p.m.


