DRAFT KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES

June 10, 2025, 5:30 p.m.

The meeting will be videotaped and recorded.

The tape recording will be erased after the minutes are done.

I. CALL TO ORDER:

- **a. Welcome:** President Seymour called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. Other directors present: Buster Beebe, Ilene Schechter, Darryl Slavin, Donna Tyner and Jill Wolf and Manager Jill Foley. Absent was Director Kelley Lee. President Seymour welcomed attendees, and Roger Kirby led the flag salute.
- **b.** Announcements: President Seymour welcomed everyone to the meeting. He stated there had been an Executive Board meeting with KCCA's insurance agent to discuss liability regarding room rentals and alcohol on the premises. According to President Seymour, the best way to reduce exposure to liability is to prohibit the use of alcohol in most but not all circumstances. Social Club President Terry Wiersum asked about the Social Club as it sometimes has alcohol at its events. President Seymour stated that because the Social Club is part of Kern City, there is a better ability to manage the use of alcohol, but the alcohol cannot be poured by the Social Club. A resident questioned if alcohol should be totally banned. President Seymour stated the Board was trying to balance the liability issues and yet allow some flexibility for events put on by Kern City and the Social Club with limited liability issues. The Executive Board also voted on requiring renters of the Town Hall to provide their own insurance. A vote was taken at the Executive Board meeting and both the motions (no alcohol allowed for renters of the Town Hall and renters needed to supply insurance) passed unanimously.
- **II. MINUTES:** Director Tyner asked if there were any corrections to the May 13, 2025 minutes. There were none so the minutes were accepted as presented.
- III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner reported that as of May 31, 2025, the Checking Account had \$20,989.93. There is

\$340,729.27 of the checking account money in a Money Market Account and \$136,043.24 of our reserve in a CD at Mechanics Bank. Therefore, the total in Mechanics Bank as of May 31, 2025 was \$497,762.44.

At Valley Strong there is \$102,639.22 in a Money Market account. At Edward Jones, there is \$230,000 in a CD, \$60,000 in another CD and \$230,000 in a Money Market account. The total in Edward Jones is \$520,000. Between the three banking institutions there is \$1,120,401.66.

President Seymour stated the office was still waiting for the results of the Walla Reserve Study which will determine how well KCCA is doing with the amount in the Reserves.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Manager Foley reported the deadline to turn in Letters to the Editor or classified ads is Friday, June 13, by noon for the July *Klarion*. On July 11 the office will be closed for the office to go through files and do some catching up. The office will be open on Saturday, July 12, from 10:00 a.m. to noon for anyone needing to come to the office. The office has not received any notices about residents passing away this month. The office appreciates notification if a resident passed away.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

a. Pool – Speaking for Director Lee, President Seymour reported the pool is 82 degrees and looks good. The morning and afternoon Aquasize classes have started up. President Seymour reported there are two water pumps for the pool filter that are alternated weekly. The motor in pump #1 froze up and currently pump #2 is doing all the work. There is an old motor that will be put into pump #1 while the non-working motor is repaired. President Seymour thanked Annete Silvey for providing 'fake' wasp nests which deter wasps from landing in the pool area. They seem to be working, Annete said previously there would be 5-6 live wasps around the pool constantly and now they only see about 1. A resident stated the stereo isn't working at the pool.

President Seymour said it is a little difficult to figure out and he will take care of it. Another resident has noticed chlorine tablets on the bottom of the pool and ask if they should be picked up and put back in their container? President Seymour asked that to prevent injury, residents should not pick up the tablets but call him or the office and it will be taken care of.

- **b. Inside Maintenance** -- Director Wolf said the stage area was painted and looks good. Four new lounge chairs have been purchased for the pool area. Pool users are asked to put the chairs back in the shade after using them to prolong their life. Director Wolf reported members of the gardening committee continue to keep the flowers looking good.
- **c.** Compliance Director Schechter stated she and Director Wolf are up to date on the compliance issues they were addressing. She asked residents to "trim the trees, keep dogs on a lease, and keep houses neat."
- **d. Outside Maintenance** Director Slavin said the concrete that was a trip hazard has been replaced. He filled in a large hole in the lawn by the woodshop.
- e. RV Storage -- Director Beebe reported he and Director Wolf have scraped the numbers for the sites and repainted them. Director Wolf repainted the numbers on the block wall. He stated everything is looking good in the RV Storage yard.
- **f. Special Projects** Speaking for Director Lee, Director Tyner said a Bakersfield Police Department Captain and officers who patrol this area will be in the Town Hall tomorrow night to address residents, providing information and answering questions. The 'Early Bird' dinner at the 19th Hole is June 27 from 4:00 6:00 p.m. and will be baby-back ribs, ranch beans, coleslaw and corn bread for \$15.95 with reservations by June 26. Without reservations the dinner is \$17.95. On July 10 a comedian, Randy Riggle, from Las Vegas will be performing in the Town Hall. Tickets will be sold in the office for \$10 and will include



POOL RULES

The Pool Rules changed in August 2024 to eliminate children's hours on Saturday nights. Now the children's hours are everyday from 10:00am to 2:00pm.

Pool area is NON-smoking

- 1. The Kern City Swimming Pool, Locker Rooms and entire pool area are for the use of Kern City members/residents and their Guests only. Members/residents must accompany their Guests.
- 2. ALL PERSONS USING THE POOL AND OTHER FACILITIES DO SO AT THEIR OWN RISK.

LIFEGUARD SERVICES ARE <u>NOT</u> AVAILABLE.

- 3. An Association resident or member must accompany his or her Guest(s) and must have a pool key card.
 - All residents entering the Pool area must enter with their pool key card. Do not open the gate for someone or allow someone to enter behind you. They must use their own key.
 - Residents in good standing may pick up a card in the office for a deposit.

HOURS

Swimming Pool hours for Members and Adult Guests over 18:

- Monday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- Saturday and Sunday 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- Note: Early morning exercisers are permitted except during pool cleaning from 7:30 to 9:00 a.m. on Monday/ Wednesday/Friday (or on Tuesday after a three-day holiday weekend) or during Aquasize classes.

Hours for all Guests between the ages of 3-18 (who must be with a resident) are:

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

a. Action on Budget Committee

- President Seymour stated it was time to create a Budget Committee. President Seymour proposed that Donna Tyner, Donna Hansen McMillin, Joe Newton, and himself be on the committee. Director Beebe made a motion to accept those names of individuals to be on the Budget Committee. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

b. Action on Painting Areas: Director Wolf stated she had contacted three painting contractors to paint the Community Room. One did not have a contractor's license and could not be considered. The Morales Painting bid was \$1,000 to paint the room and the interior doors with Kern City providing the paint. Hernandez Painting submitted a bid of \$3,100 to paint the interior and its interior doors and they would supply the paint. Morales Painting also submitted a bid of \$150 to paint the flagpole out front. Director Wolf said Morales Painting painted the stage area in the Town Hall and did a

good job, and he is the lowest bidder. Director Wolf made a motion to accept the bid of \$1,000 to paint the Community Room and \$150 to paint the flagpole from Morales Painting with Kern City providing the paint. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

c. Action on Trimming Palm

Trees: President Seymour stated Kern City normally trims some trees once a year and other trees another time a year and some trees every two years. Manager Foley reported that Kern City needs to trim the palm trees around the pool and the trees on Sundale. A resident was concerned there would be a mess in the pool when they trimmed those trees. President Seymour and Manager Foley said they would coordinate the trimming of the trees with the pool maintenance man so the pool could be cleaned immediately after the trees were cut. H United Tree Service provided a bid of \$1,385 to trim 16 palm trees at the pool, \$950 for 3 large date palms and \$1,950 for 7 large silver palms. Director Tyner made a motion to accept the bid from H United Tree Service for \$4,285 to trim all those palm trees. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

VIII. DIRECTORS FORUM:

Director Slavin wondered if Morales Painting could submit a bid on painting the electrical boxes since they need to be sanded before being painted. President Seymour said to get a bid. Director Slavin also said one of the electrical boxes has a broken hinge, President Seymour said he would take a look at it. IX. AUDIENCE:

They discovered there is no air conditioning in the kitchen coming through the vent because it's just an exhaust vent. Air conditioning for the kitchen will be looked into. Another resident stated the flowers around Kern City look outstanding. President Seymour stated there were old items like metal in the area of the pool filters that he will have hauled off since those items are a safety hazard.

A resident asked if there was a response from Sundale Golf Course about the skunks, Presi-

dent Seymour said the office was still in contact with them. Another resident stated the golfers are becoming loud, unruly and using a lot of profanity. Manager Foley stated two other residents have complained to the office and she contacted the golf course owner Dr. Patel who said he would post information for the golfers to be mindful of the residents. Manager Foley said the Shred Event was a success with about 105 residents taking advantage of it. Director Beebe reported that \$1,041 was collected at the Shred Event for the Honor Flight and with some other donations from Kern City residents he turned in \$1,371 to Honor Flight today. He was told three Kern City residents would be going on the next Honor Flight. Director Beebe then thanked the Social Club and all the volunteers for all they do for Kern City.

Carol Ann Toms from Kern City Apartments Inc. (KCAI) said there would be 24 vendors at the Vendor Fair on Aug. 23. There will be lawyers, insurance companies, mobile dog grooming as well as other vendors that provide services Kern City residents might be interested in. Another resident thanked whoever got the 'speed' signs put up on Sundale.

X. ADJOURNMENT – President Seymour adjourned the meeting at 6:48 p.m. The next meeting will be on July 8 at 9:00 a.m.

worry you're wasting their time. Even if you think that they won't come out right away, report it!"

Captain Matthew Gregory and Sergeant Eric Celadon both emphasized that they want people to report suspicious or criminal activity because even if they cannot send officers immediately, it will show the police what kind of problems are occurring here. They also explained that they only have a certain number of officers, so if there is a robbery, murder or assault, they may not be able to respond to some concerns for a while, but they still want to see the report.

President Seymour added, "The more reports the police receive, the more patrols they



send to Kern City. We really appreciate people who take the time to let them know what's going on."

Approximately 85 people listened to the police discussing their efforts to improve their interactions with communities. They discussed available safety and volunteer programs and asked what areas residents are concerned

about.

Residents responded with concerns about homeless people, possible thieves casing the neighborhoods, speeders, vehicle thefts, and animal control. Two people asked about thefts at stores who get away with the crimes and were told that the police are arresting more people for stealing from stores and vandalizing businesses.

"I'm really impressed with the desire of the police to connect more with our people," said Seymour. "This latest meet-

ing showed their sincerity in having a positive relationship with the people. They want us to understand what they're trying to do, and they want to know what we are interested in.
