President’s message

Hello Kern City Residents! The dog days of summer are here. Extreme heat can pose serious health risks, particularly for seniors. As people age, their bodies become less efficient at regulating temperature, making older adults more vulnerable to heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Underlying medical conditions, medications, and reduced mobility can further increase this risk, highlighting the importance of proactive measures during periods of extreme heat.

One major factor affecting seniors is that they may not feel thirst as acutely, leading to dehydration, which worsens the effects of high temperatures. Additionally, some medications commonly prescribed for heart disease, high blood pressure, or depression can impair the body’s ability to regulate heat or retain fluids. This combination can make even moderately high temperatures dangerous for older adults.

Living conditions also play a role. Seniors who live alone, especially without air conditioning, are at higher risk. Limited access to cooling centers or transportation can prevent them from escaping hot environments. In rural or lower-income areas, where resources may be scarcer, the threat is even more pronounced. To reduce the risks, it is vital for seniors and their caregivers to take preventive steps. Staying hydrated is crucial — even if one does not feel thirsty. Wearing light, breathable clothing and avoiding outdoor activities during peak sun hours (usually between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.) can help regulate body temperature. Keeping the living environment cool with fans, air conditioning, or by drawing curtains during the day is also beneficial.

Community awareness and support are equally important. Family members, neighbors, and community services should regularly check in on elderly individuals during heat waves. Local governments and organizations

DRAFT KCCA'S REGULAR BOARD MEETING MINUTES

July 8, 2025, 9:00 a.m.

The meeting will be videotaped and recorded. The tape recording will be erased after the minutes are done.

I. CALL TO ORDER:

a. Welcome: President Seymour called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Other directors present: Buster Beebe, Kelley Lee, Ilene Schechter, Darryl Slavin, Donna Tyner and Jill Wolf and Manager Jill Foley. President Seymour welcomed attendees, and Roger Kirby led the flag salute.

b. Announcements: President Seymour welcomed everyone to the meeting. He stated an insert was in the July Klarion stating members can now pick up an application to run for director. He said there are four seats that will be vacant and applications are in the office. To qualify, the candidate must have been a homeowner for one year, have paid assessments, and not have a felony conviction that prevents KCCA from getting a fidelity bond.

II. MINUTES: Director Tyner asked if there were any corrections to the June 11, 2025 minutes. There were none so the minutes were accepted as presented.

III. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Tyner reported that as of June 30, 2025, at Mechanics Bank the Checking Account had \$16,854.01. There is \$296,246.40 of the checking account money in a Money Market Account and \$136,476.53 of our Reserves in a CD. Therefore, the total in Mechanics Bank as of June 30, 2025 was \$449,576.94.

At Valley Strong there is \$102,942.08 in a Money Market account. At Edward Jones, there is \$229,868 in one CD, \$59,922 in another CD and \$230,805.12 in a Money Market account. The total in Edward Jones is \$520,595.12. Between the three banking institutions there is \$1,073,114.14.

IV. MANAGER'S REPORT: Manager Foley reported the deadline to turn in Letters to the Editor or classified ads is Tuesday, July 15, by noon for the August Klarion. On July 11, the office will be closed for the office to go through files and do some catching up. The office will be open on Saturday, July 12, from 10:00 a.m. to noon for anyone

needing to come into the office, and there will be a Meet and Greet from 10:30 a.m. to noon that day. Manager Foley reminded residents if they have a garage sale/yard sale to remember to take down any signs immediately after the sale. The office has learned of the passing Kimberly Murphy, Easter Smothers and Don Steckdaub.

V. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

a. Pool – Director Lee reported the pool is 77 degrees and will warm up as the weather warms. The radio at the pool is not working and stated if anyone would like to donate one which plays a radio and CDs, it would be appreciated. This is the fourth radio that has either broken or been stolen.

b. Inside Maintenance -- Director Wolf said the Community Room and the flagpole will be painted on Friday by Morales Painting. She thanked the gardening group for all their hard work.

c. Compliance – Director Wolf stated she and Director Schechter drive around the community to keep track of homes for sale or for rent. That also helps them notice any issues. The office gets calls asking about rentals, so this helps to provide that information. She also stated that about four properties that were not in compliance have been brought into compliance.

d. Outside Maintenance – Director Slavin said the water heater in the activities wing has broken and the plumbing company will be out on Wednesday to fix it. There is cold water available for showering before getting into the pool. The city painted the necessary curbs in the front of the office. Rankin electric will be out on Monday to fix some electrical issues behind the Town Hall.

e. RV Storage -- Director Beebe reported the RV storage is about 95% weed free because the previous spraying that was done has killed most of the weeds. There is a tree branch hanging over the fence from a neighbor's house and he will cut it down.

f. Special Projects – Director Tyner said the Las Vegas comedian will be here Thursday night. The cost will be \$10 and includes a light dinner. The Meet and Greet event helps newcomers and current residents learn more about Kern City and

is on Saturday from 10:30 a.m. to noon. The 'Early Bird' dinner at the 19th Hole is July 25 from 4:00 – 6:00 p.m. and will be a Basque Dinner with fried chicken, spaghetti, beans, salsa, cabbage soup, and sourdough bread for \$15.95 with reservations by July 24. Without reservations the dinner is \$17.95. The Ice Cream Social will be on Thursday, July 24, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., with the Directors scooping.

g. Library -- Director Tyner said the Library needs newer books although all donations (10 years old or newer) are appreciated. She encouraged everyone to enjoy the cool library to sit, read or put the puzzle together during these hot days.

h. Local Associations – Director Schechter reported she and President Seymour and Director Wolf attend local association meetings. KCAI is holding a Vendor Expo on Aug. 23rd and residents of Kern City can attend and find businesses that offer services needed by homeowners.

VI. OLD BUSINESS: None

VII. NEW BUSINESS:

a. Action on Revising Pool Rules – President Seymour stated the board is proposing to change the pool rules to allow only four guests at one time in the pool/pool area per property. He stated the reason for this rule change was that families are often bringing in large groups that take over the pool area inhibiting the use by residents. Another rule change is to make clear that the only beverage allowed in the pool area is water in a plastic bottle or metal drinking container. Residents with medical issues will be an exception. Another rule is to clearly state that suntan oils are not allowed in the pool as they leave a 'ring' on the tile. President Seymour reminded pool users they may not interfere with the vendors taking care of the pool. The pool maintenance man tries to work around swimmers, but swimmers need to be respectful. The revised rules will go out to members, and they will have 28 days to respond in writing to the office. Director Wolf made a motion to send the revised rules to the members, and they will be voted on at the next meeting. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

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Library News

Well, I hope you came in the Library last month and entered the drawing for \$100 sponsored by the Social Club. We'll be doing it again this month but you have to enter again. Good luck!

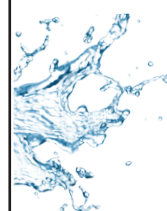

2. ALL PERSONS USING THE POOL AND OTHER FACILITIES DO SO AT THEIR OWN RISK.

LIFEGUARD SERVICES ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

3. An Association resident or member must accompany his or her Guest(s) and must have a pool key card.
 - All residents entering the Pool area must enter with their pool key card. **Do not open the gate for someone or allow someone to enter behind you. They must use their own key.**
 - Residents in good standing may pick up a card in the office for a deposit.

HOURS

Swimming Pool hours for Members and Adult Guests over 18:

- Monday through Friday – 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.
- Saturday and Sunday – 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Showing Kindness

The 1992 Olympics are now history, but while they were in progress, we remembered the story of Henry Pearce of Australia, who was competing in the single scull rowing event at the 1928 Olympics. He was leading when a duck and her string of ducklings came into view up ahead. They were on a collision course and Pearce reckoned that his scull would cut the string in two and sink a few ducklings in the process, so he pulled in his oars. When the ducks passed, Pearce again bent his back to the task.

There’s a happy ending to the story. Pearce won. Usually, acts of sportsmanship result in defeat. Remember Leo Durocher’s pronouncement, “Nice guys finish last”? It happened a couple of years ago in the marathon tandem kayak racing event at the world championships in Copenhagen. Danish paddlers were leading when their rudder was damaged in a portage. British paddlers, who were in second place, stopped to help the Danes fix it. The Danes went on to defeat the British by one second in an event that lasted nearly three hours. But there’s a happy ending to this story, too.

According to The Wall Street Journal, the British kayakers won what many people regard as the highest honor in sports. They became the winner of the Pierre de Coubertin International Fair Play Trophy. The trophy is named for the founder of the modern Olympic Games, and it has been awarded annually for the past 28 years to people in sports who have demonstrated nobility of spirit.

It is big news in Europe, but it has not been given

much recognition in the United States. In the past, the trophy has gone to a Hungarian tennis player who pleaded with officials to give his opponent more time to recover from a cramp, and to a high school basketball coach who forfeited the Georgia (US) state championship after he found out that one of his players was scholastically ineligible. The first trophy went to an Italian bobsledder named Eugenio Monti for a gesture that exhibited a touch of class. In the two-man bobsled event at the 1964 Innsbruck Olympics, Monti was the leader after his final run. The only one given a chance to beat him was Tony Nash of Great Britain. As Nash and his teammate got ready for their final run, they discovered that a critical bolt on their sled had snapped at the last moment. Monti was informed of the problem and immediately took the corresponding bolt from his own sled and sent it up to Nash. Nash fixed his sled, came hurtling down the course to set a record and won the gold medal. (Bits & Pieces, October 15, 1992, pp. 4-6.)

The Apostle Paul wrote to the believers in Ephesus in Eph. 4:32, “Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.” Forgiveness and kindness go a long way within a community.

The Stages of Alzheimer's

Editor's note: The Alzheimer's Association provided the following information to help residents identify what a loved one might be experiencing with their health. The association also offers a 24/7 Helpline at 800.272.3900.

Alzheimer's disease typically progresses in three stages: early, middle and late (sometimes referred to as mild, moderate and severe in a medical context). However, Alzheimer's affects people in different ways, and each person may experience dementia symptoms — or progress through the stages — differently.

Early Stage Alzheimer's, Mild

A person may function independently at this

stage. They may still drive, work and socialize. However, the person may experience memory lapses, such as forgetting familiar words or the location of everyday objects.

Symptoms may not be widely apparent at this stage, but family and close friends may take notice and a doctor would be able to identify symptoms using certain diagnostic tools. Some people with early-stage Alzheimer's may be eligible to receive U.S. Food and Drug Administration-approved treatments that can change the course of disease progression.

Middle Stage, Moderate

Typically the longest stage, middle-stage Alzheimer's can last for many years. As the

disease progresses and the symptoms become more pronounced, the person living with Alzheimer's will require a greater level of care. Damage to nerve cells in the brain can also make it difficult for the person to express thoughts and perform routine tasks without assistance.

In this stage, the person living with Alzheimer's can still participate in daily activities with assistance.

Late Stage Alzheimer's, Severe

In the final stage of the disease, dementia symptoms are severe. Individuals lose the

b. Action on Pool Leveler Purchase -- President Seymour stated the office has already bought a pool leveling system that is wireless for the pool and would like the Board's approval. Currently the water level is checked by either him, the pool maintenance person, or a member. The water has dropped at times, and it is important that all the plaster, including on the steps, remain underwater to keep the warranty valid. This water leveling system will sense the water level seven times a day and will automatically fill the pool as needed. The cost of the leveler is \$1,384.52 with a \$10 monthly charge. Director Tyner made a motion to approve the purchase of the pool leveler. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

c. Action on Elections Inspector, Candidate Window – President Seymour proposed that Linda Wong be the Inspector of Elections as she held that position last year and is willing to continue in that position. He also asked the Board to vote

to close the candidate application window timeline on Aug. 29 at noon. Applications can be picked up in the office. Director Lee made a motion to accept Linda Wong as the Inspector of Elections and the window to submit application to close on Aug. 29 at noon. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

d. Action of Adding Mobile Pickleball Court – Director Lee stated she had broken down the cost for a removeable net and getting the court ready for pickleball. She proposed putting the court by the stage on the patio behind the Town Hall. There is room for two courts there but we'll only get a net for one court to start. The cost will be: \$56.48 for the concrete patch, \$560 for court paint, \$64.88 for court lines, \$245.56 for the court net (on wheels). The total cost would be \$926.92. Director Tyner made a motion to start a pickleball court and spend the money to get the court ready and for the net. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

VIII. DIRECTORS FORUM:

Director Tyner suggested members meet their neighbors and talk with them, especially if there are issues,

and to be respectful and kind to each other and use common sense.

IX. AUDIENCE:

Social Club: Terry Wiersum, President of the Social Club stated there were 95 people at the July 4th breakfast. On Sunday from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m., the Social Club will sell hot-dogs and the Town Hall will be open to avoid the heat. The Let's Color group meets on July 18 and all are welcome. She encouraged members to come into the Library in July and August to sign up to win \$100. All residents are eligible but must fill out an entry form in the Library.

Members: An audience member reported there is no water in the showers. President Seymour said he would look into it. Another member questioned the court repair for the pickleball court. Director Lee stated the uneven areas of the court will be patched. Another member asked if the bench in front of the Town Hall could be painted. President Seymour suggested residents step forward and offer to fix things as appropriate as this saves the association money. Another resident asked about the

feral cats. President Seymour stated the cat committee will trap cats again and take them to Critters without Litters for neutering. He reminded residents they need to handle the animal problems at their homes and not just rely on board members. He stated there is still the issue of some residents who keep feeding feral cats. A resident asked about the homeless breaking into empty homes. President Seymour says it still happens occasionally and encouraged residents to call the police when they see someone around an empty house. President Seymour said the Walla Reserve Study should be completed next week.

X. ADJOURNMENT – President Seymour adjourned the meeting at 9:52 a.m. The next meeting will be on August 12, at 8:00 a.m.

ability to respond to their environment, to carry on a conversation and, eventually, to control movement. They may still say words or phrases, but communicating pain becomes difficult. As memory and cognitive skills continue to worsen, significant personality changes may take place, requiring individuals to need extensive care.

While someone living with Alzheimer’s may not be able to initiate much engagement during the late stage, they can still benefit from interaction in

ways that are appropriate, like listening to relaxing music or receiving reassurance through gentle touch.
