Homeowner's obligations are included and require a member vote to change. 2. RULES AND REGULATIONS for homeowners are day-to-day conduct and may be changed with a vote by the HOA board. 3. BYLAWS provide guidance how the organization will function such as

Members (homeowners), if you would like to apply for a position on the Kern City Board of Directors for the 2027-2028 term, applications are still being accepted in the office until noon on Monday, Aug. 10. There are three seats open.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for established members -- those who have lived here at least a year -- to participate more in our community," said Board President Joe Newton.

"Our board really needs people who are willing to spend time working on projects. We keep costs down

when directors help out so we really appreciate those who will do that. Also, directors need to be team players who consider all sides and work for solutions that benefit the community."

Qualifications include:

- You must have owned your Kern City home for at least one year.
- You must be current in your assessment payments.
- Applicants cannot have a criminal record that can affect KCCA's fidelity bond coverage.
- Two members from the same residence cannot serve at the same time.

Ballots will be mailed out in September and the voting results will be announced at the Annual Meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 10, 2026.

There will also be a Candidates Night later so members can hear from those running for director. Watch the Klarion for the date.

Directors whose terms are expiring this year are Buster Bebee, Ilene Schechter, and Donna Tyner.

VI. COMMITTEE REPORTS:

a. Pool - President Newton reported the pump for the vacuum has been repaired. Now a filter motor is not working and needs to be repaired. The voltage is not consistent so Top Dog would like to install a buck booster. Because this is a voltage issue, the \$1,272.73 pump repair is not under warranty.

b. Inside Maintenance – Director Slavin said he replaced all nine first-aid kits and they are OSHA compliant. He also replaced the water filter in the kitchen.

c. Outside Maintenance -- Director Slavin said the trees in the parking lot need to be trimmed.

d. RV Storage -- Director Beebe said the new wheelbarrow is at the RV Storage. Directors Beebe and Newton trimmed some bushes that were growing through the fence.

e. Special Projects - Director Tyner said the Shred Event went well, and 118 residents dropped off shredding. The board paid for the event, and residents donated \$2,061.52 to the Honor Flight. The Ice Cream Social will be July 7th from 5:30-7:00 p.m. and is free to residents. More information will be in the *Klarion*. The Early Bird Dinner at the Sundale Country Club is on June 26th and will include two pieces of chicken, salad, corn on the cob and watermelon. With reservations, the cost is \$15.95 and without it is \$17.95. The number can be found in the *Klarion*.

f. Library - Director Tyner said she received a donation of newer books from the Books of the Month Club, which she really appreciated. The Library also received three boxes of biographies of movie stars from the past. They will be on a shelf and do not need to be signed out. Director Tyner stated she is looking for someone interested in learning about the Library and taking over for her. She has been running the Library, with the help of some wonderful volunteers, for the last 12 years and is looking forward to stepping down in the next few years. Please contact her or stop by the Library to learn more.

g. Compliance, CC&Rs – Director Schechter stated she and Director Toms have checked out some properties, and Director Slavin also sent her some photos of compliance issues. Recent issues have been the number of unleashed dogs running loose outside and residents not picking up after their dogs.

h. Community Relations – Director Tyner said there was nothing to report.

i. Local Associations – Director Schechter reported she has been updating information regarding HOA dues and officers as she receives it.

VII. OLD BUSINESS: None

VIII. NEW BUSINESS:

a. Action on Tree Trimming – Director Slavin stated the trees in the parking lot are hanging low and touching the top of cars. H United Tree Service submitted a bid of \$1,850 to trim the 6 trees in the parking lot. Director Tyner made a motion to accept the bid by H United Tree Service to trim the 6 trees in the parking lot for \$1,850. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

b. Action on Bank Accounts – Director Hansen McMillin stated the CD at Edward Jones for \$230,000 matured and \$2,334.05 of interest for 2025 was put into operations and \$2,000 of interest for 2026 will be re-invested in the new CD. There is \$20,000 to deposit into the Reserves from the 2026 budget. It was recommended that the one CD of \$230,000 be split into two CDs so the total amount doesn't go over the \$250,000 insured amount. The new CDs will be for one year and the interest rate is 4.5%. Director Hansen McMillin made a motion to split the one CD into two CDs. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

Director Hansen McMillin suggested not moving money out of Mechanics Bank at this time as it is likely that within two or three months the amount will be under \$250,000 which is the amount insured. The bank is strong and does not have any issues. Also, the current interest rate at Mechanics bank for the Money Market account is 1.26% whereas other institutions are only offering 0.20%. The Board has reviewed the issue and will leave the money as is at Mechanics Bank.

c. Action on CPA – Director Hansen McMillin stated the CPA has made some requested revisions to the 2025 end-of-year review and when Directors have reviewed it, it will be available to the members. The current CPA has filed for an extension on the 2025 taxes. Hansen McMillin stated the office is looking for a new CPA at this time. There will be an Executive Board meeting as soon as we receive information from the contacted CPAs to vote on a new one.

d. Action on Asphalt – Director Slavin stated the

II. ANNOUNCEMENTS: President Newton stated the annual elections for 2027-2028 are open and residents can pick up an application in the office. Members must meet qualifications which can be found in the office or by calling the office. There will be three vacancies as Directors Beebe, Tyner and Schechter will be leaving the board.

III. MINUTES: Director Hansen McMillin asked if there were any corrections to the May 12, 2026 meeting minutes. There were none so the minutes were accepted as presented.

IV. TREASURER'S REPORT: Director Hansen McMillin reported that as of May 31, 2026, the Checking Account had \$61,416.09. There was \$316,696.24 of the checking account money in a Money Market Account at Mechanics Bank. Therefore, the total in Mechanics Bank as of May 31, 2026 was \$378,112.33.

In the Edward Jones account, there was a total of \$298,786.40 in the CD accounts. There was \$232,010.24 waiting to go into a CD. There was also \$239,735.77 in a Money Market account. The total in Edward Jones was \$770,532.41. Between the banking institutions, there was \$1,148,644.74.

V. MANAGER'S REPORT: Manager Foley reported the deadline to turn in Letters to the Editor or classified ads is Monday, June 15th, by noon for the July *Klarion*. She would like everything to be turned in this week if possible. On July 10th, a kit fox expert from CSUB will give a talk in the Town Hall and a light lunch will be served. More information will be in the *Klarion*. On Saturday, July 18th, the Salvation Army will have a truck in the parking lot from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. for residents to drop off items for donation, and more information will be in the *Klarion*. 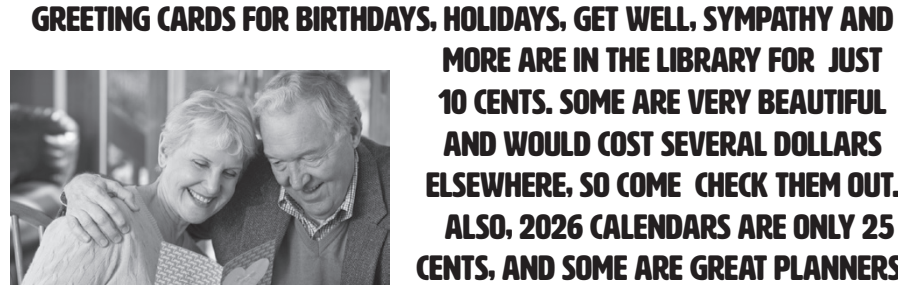

Stay cool and hydrated during hot weather

Editor’s note: The following information is provided by the Centers for Disease Control.

Older adults do not adjust as well as young people to sudden changes in temperature.

They are more likely to have a chronic medical condition that changes normal body responses to heat. Seniors are also more likely to take prescription medicines that affect the body’s ability to control its temperature or sweat.

For many reasons, people should follow these steps to stay safe on hot days.

- Stay cool and stay hydrated.
- Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as possible. If your home doesn’t have air conditioning, check out the Library or an air-conditioned shelter in your area.
- Do not rely on a fan as your main cooling source when it’s really hot outside.
- Drink more water than usual and don’t wait until you’re thirsty to drink. If your doctor limits the amount of fluids you drink or has you on water pills, ask them how much you should drink during hot weather.
- Don’t use the stove or oven to cook—it will make you and your house hotter.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

The United States of AMERICA @250

Lesser known Founding Fathers of the United States



When Americans celebrate the 250th anniversary of the United States throughout 2026, names like George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, and John Adams are bound to come up. While those four men played notable roles in the establishment of the United States of America, many more Founding Fathers bore significant influence as well.

America's semiquincentennial is a great time to celebrate all who have helped make the country into what it is today, and that includes some of the Founding Fathers who have not become household names over the last 250 years.

• William Livingston:

Born in Albany, New York, in 1723, William Livingston was a prominent attorney prior to the outbreak of the American Revolutionary War. The Historical Society of the New York Courts notes Livingston moved to Elizabethtown, New Jersey, in 1772. Within two years of that move, Livingston became New Jersey's representative to the Continental Congress. By June 1776, Livingston was appointed brigadier general of the New Jersey militia, a position he held until 1777, when he became the Governor of New Jersey. Livingston was a target of British forces, who offered a reward for his capture. But Livingston remained Governor of New Jersey until his death in 1790, and even served as the New Jersey delegate to the Constitutional Convention in 1787, when he signed the United States Constitution adopted at that convention.

• William Hooper:

William Hooper was born Boston in 1742, but he made his name as a Founding Father after relocating to Wilmington, North Carolina, as a young adult. The National Constitution Center notes Hooper, like Livingston, was a successful attorney. Hooper was appointed Deputy Attorney General of the North Carolina colony in 1770, and even supported the Royal Governor's efforts to suppress a taxation-related rebellion of North Carolina farmers during this pivotal period, when he was

notably dragged through the streets by angry rioters. By the mid-1770s, Hooper had changed course, and was even among the three delegates chosen to represent North Carolina at the First Continental Congress in 1774. Prior to that conference, Hooper wrote to a friend that the colonies were destined to win independence from the Crown, an assertion that ultimately earned him the nickname the "Prophet of Independence." Hooper signed the Declaration of Independence but illness forced him to retire from politics. He continued to support the war effort, donating much of his legal earnings to the colonists' cause, and was so reviled by the British that his home was burned down when Wilmington was taken by Crown forces in 1781.

• John Witherspoon:

John Witherspoon was born in Scotland in 1723 and moved to what would become the United States in 1768. Witherspoon is unique among signatories of the Declaration of Independence because he is the only active clergyman and the only college president to sign the document. Witherspoon later signed the Articles of Confederation and supported the ratification of the Constitution. Witherspoon came to New Jersey to become president of the College of New Jersey (now Princeton University), which educated many notable figures from the era, including James Madison and Aaron Burr. All told, 12 members of the Continental Congress studied

at the school while Witherspoon was president. The Presbyterian Witherspoon supported colonial independence for various reasons, and was especially opposed to the Crown's attempt to appoint an American Anglican bishop, speaking out against British interference in colonial affairs in a sermon titled "The Dominion of Providence Over the Passions of Men" during a 1776 sermon. Like Hooper, Witherspoon was convinced independence was the path forward for the colonies.

• Roger Sherman:

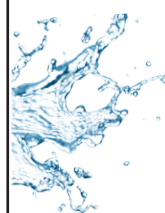
Born in Newton, Massachusetts, in 1721, Roger Sherman was a multitasking Founding Father who began to study law in the mid-1750s after working as an author, general store owner, and surveyor, among other jobs. By 1766, Sherman was so established in the legal profession that he was appointed a judge of the Superior Court of Connecticut. Though he initially expressed reservations regarding colonists' resistance to the Crown, by 1774 he agreed to serve as a Connecticut delegate to the First Continental Congress. Sherman joined the committee to draft the Declaration of Independence in mid-1776, and later represented Connecticut on the drafting committee of the Articles of Confederation. Sherman also holds the unique distinction of being the only person to sign the Declaration of Independence, the Articles of Confederation and the Constitution.

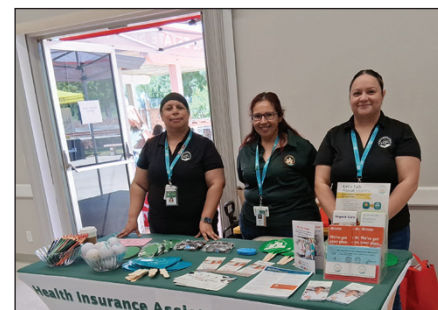

**Please note: Do not enter the pool between 6:30 to 8:30 a.m. Mondays and Fridays when our poolman is here.
Also, be sure to be out of the pool area before 10:00 p.m. at night.**

1. The Kern City Swimming Pool, Locker Rooms and entire pool area are for the use of Kern City members/residents and their Guests only. Members/residents must accompany their Guests.
2. ALL PERSONS USING THE POOL AND OTHER FACILITIES DO SO **AT THEIR OWN RISK.**
LIFEGUARD SERVICES ARE NOT AVAILABLE.
3. An Association resident or member must accompany his or her Guest(s) and must have a pool key card.
There is a limit of four (4) guests per resident's property who can accompany the resident to the pool and pool area each time.
 - All residents entering the Pool area must enter with their pool key card. Do not open the gate for someone or allow someone to enter behind you. They must use their own key.
 - Residents in good standing may pick up a pool key card in the office for a deposit.
 - **EVERYONE MUST TAKE A SHOWER** before entering the Swimming Pool even if they showered before arriving
4. No child under 3 years of age will be permitted in the Pool.
5. Absolutely **NO DIAPERS** (children's or adult's) are permitted in the pool.
6. Rafts, balls and toys are not permitted in the Pool Area. Fins, Snorkels and Safety Aids are permitted.
7. Games, Stunts, Running, Diving, jumping in and all types of horseplay are prohibited in the Pool and Pool area.

HOURS Swimming Pool hours for Members and Adult Guests over 18:

- Monday through Friday – 10:00am to 10:00pm.
- Saturday and Sunday – 9:00am to 10:00pm
- Note: Early morning exercisers are permitted except during pool cleaning from 7:30 to 9:00am on Monday/Wednesday/Friday (or on Tuesday after a three-day holiday weekend). No one may interfere with Aquasize classes which meet 9:00-10:00am MWF and 4-5pm M-F.

HOURS for Guests between ages 3-18 (who must be with a resident) are:

- Every day (Sunday through Saturday) from 10:00am to 2:00pm.
- All children must be gone from the pool and pool area by 2:00pm each day.

8. No foods and beverages, except water in plastic bottles, are allowed in the pool area.
No glass or breakable plastic is allowed in the pool area. Ice chests and other containers with food are NOT allowed in the pool area.

parking lot needs to be resealed as there is a hole in the asphalt and numerous cracks. The landscapers will run a water line from the lawn to the flower beds and cap it for future use as well as ensure water is not leaking from the previous leak by the parking lot. It will take about two weeks after the hole is patched before the parking lot can be resealed and then two more weeks before it can be driven on. Kern Asphalt bid \$5,123 to reseat the parking lot and the turnaround in front of the office and stripe the parking lot. Bakersfield Paving bid \$11,836 and Bowman Asphalt bid \$8,555. Director Tyner made a motion to accept the bid from Kern Asphalt for \$5,123 as long as it includes the turnaround and striping. Vote: Passed, unanimous.

e. Emergency Action on Pool Pump Repairs

— President Newton stated Top Dog gave a bid \$1,272.73 to add a buck booster to correct the voltage issues to the main pool pump. After discussion it was decided to also have Rankin review the electrical issues related to the fluctuation of voltage. Director Beebe made a motion to accept the bid from Top Dog to add a buck booster to the pool pump. Vote passed, unanimous.

IX. DIRECTORS FORUM — Director Beebe thanked everyone who volunteered their time at the shred event. He also let residents know CSUB has installed cameras around the activities wing to monitor the kit foxes. Director Toms stated she is researching the pickleball court. She also thanked everyone who participated or attended the Vendor Expo.
